## **In the 5th Grade Classroom**

- ◆ Meet and communicate with parents throughout the year.
- ◆ Provide reading level appropriate books for students to read on their own.
- ◆ Monitor student progress with updates to parents through phone calls and Progress Book.
- ◆ Make sure each student gets the help he/she needs as soon as it's needed.
- ◆ Send home literacy learning materials.
- ◆ Use a variety of teaching methods in reading to ensure I can reach students of all levels.
- ◆ Make sure students understand assignments, their purpose and what they will learn from them.

## **At Home**

Duggan school parents joined staff to develop ideas about how families can support students' reading ability and comprehension.

- ◆ Encourage my child to read everyday.
- ◆ Participate in any workshops (when I am available) that are offered by the school.
- ◆ Meet and communicate with my child's teacher throughout the year.
- ◆ Check and maintain student communication folders on a daily basis.
- ◆ Provide my child a quiet homework area (if possible) and show them how to organize.
